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Reg 84 Development Requirements

When a new development or existing development is deemed by ACWWA to utilize reclaimed water for irrigation purposes, the requirements imposed by The Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) dictate that a User Plan to Comply (UPC) form must be filled out by someone with legal authority for that entity. The legal contact will be responsible for regulating the reclaimed water program for that entity. This entity is defined as the “user”. Once the UPC is filled out, the signed *original* will be sent to the ACWWA Regulation 84 coordinator (contact Development Services for this information) and a modification to ACWWA’s Letter of intent will be generated. The modification letter and UPC will be sent into CDPHE for review. If CDPHE accepts the terms of the UPC, CDPHE will issue a Notice of Authorization (NOA) to the user granting them authorization to use the reclaimed water.

Note: Until the user has been issued an NOA by CDPHE, no reclaimed water can be used on the site. This can be a problem where landscape development has started and vegetation has been planted but irrigation water cannot be used until CDPHE provides approval.

The approval process for issuing the NOA to the user can take up to 3 months. Its best to get this process started as soon as it is determined that reclaimed water will be used for irrigation.

Requirements Outlined

1. Determination of reclaimed water to be used for irrigation for development
2. User must fill out a UPC and submit the signed original back to ACWWA’s Regulation 84 coordinator
3. ACWWA needs to submit an amendment to CDPHE
4. CDPHE review of UPC (Could take up to 3 months for full review and issuance of NOA to user)
5. Once the user has the NOA, reclaimed water can flow to the user.
